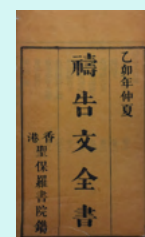
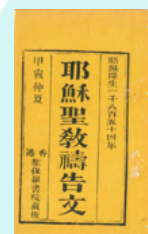

MESSAGE FROM THE ARCHIVIST

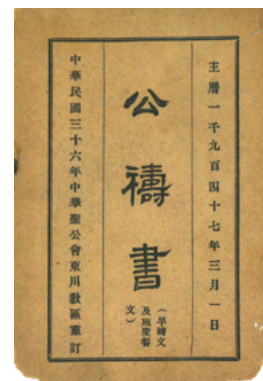

ARCHIVES ACTIVITIES

VIRTUAL TOUR OF HKSKH ARCHIVES



HKSKH Archives was invited by SKH Ming Hua Theological College to take part in a "Worldwide-live tours" project. The Archives co-operated with Rapidwide Company & The Library Fair Committee, Japan and the Libraries Research Group of Charles Sturt University, Australia, to present a 40-minute introduction and tour of our work online on 12 June 2021.

BOOK LAUNCH & RECITAL

A Book Launch for *Hong Kong's Last English Bishop The Life and Times of John Gilbert Hindley Baker* by Philip L. Wickeri, our Archivist, was held in the Archives on 16 October. The Launch was followed by a recital featuring performances by Mr. Adam Mok on the Guqin and Dr. Chen Ruiwen on the piano.



HAPPY VALLEY CEMETERY TOUR

A historical tour to the Happy Valley Cemetery was organized by the Archives on 23 October 2021. Thirty participants toured the Chapel of the Resurrection located there, which served as a chapel-of-ease for St. John's Cathedral prior to the Second World War. The group also visited the graves of various well-known Hong Kong and SKH-related figures.



RESEARCHERS & VISITORS

The HKSKH Archives closed 4 December 2020 and reopened for research and visits on 22 February 2021. Since the reopening we have received about 20 researchers working on a variety of topics involving areas of SKH history. Most are doctoral students, while others are church members, local students, or persons with an interest in local history.



Our Archives had 41 guests in 2020 and so far more than 260 guests in 2021. We also received several groups of visitors during this year. These included principals and religious teachers at SKH schools, the youth group of St. Matthias' Church, the Hong Kong Methodist Church Archives Committee, a Chung Chi College group and a student group from the University of Hong Kong.

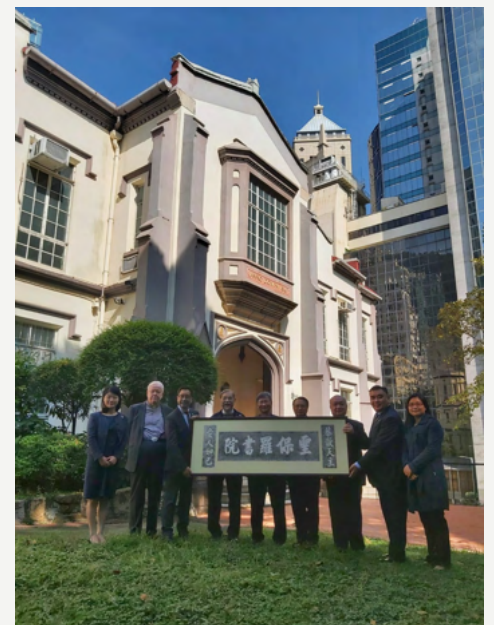

The Bishop's House, which now houses the Archives, originally also housed St. Paul's College. To celebrate its 170th anniversary, the College invited a conservation expert, Dr. Karen Fong, who is also the parent of a St. Paul's student, to make a rubbing of the original stone signage of that institution, which includes an accompanying couplet (聖保羅書院 恭敬天主 愛人如己), in the Bishop's House, in July. St. Paul's College representatives and Dr. Fong visited our Archives on 24 November to present a framed rubbing of the signage. Archbishop Andrew Chan, Bishop Matthias Der and Bishop Emeritus Thomas Soo were invited by the College to share and witness to this meaningful moment. The College principal, Mr. Dennis Yuen, noted that the project was a collaboration between the Church, the College, teachers and parents, thus renewing the historical ties between the Church and the College.



RESEARCH & PUBLICATIONS

HISTORICAL RESEARCH CENTRE

The Centre for Historical Research of the Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui Archives conducts research on the history of Anglicanism and Christianity in Greater China. We are compiling a listing of Anglican clergy from the early nineteenth century to the present; preparing a series of booklets on HKSKH bishops; and identifying Chinese Christians and foreign missionaries who have been related to Anglican history. Some of this is reflected in our book series “Sheng Kung Hui: Historical Studies of Anglican Christianity in China” published by the Hong Kong University Press. We are also publishing histories of selected Hong Kong parishes in Chinese, as well as essays in Chinese and in English for peer reviewed journals and other publications.

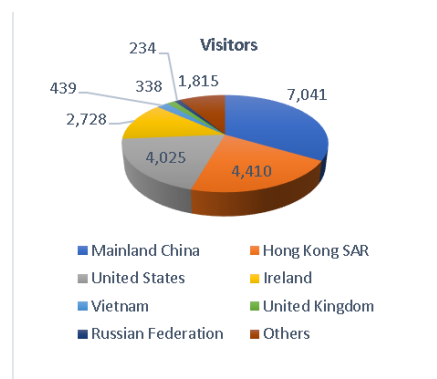

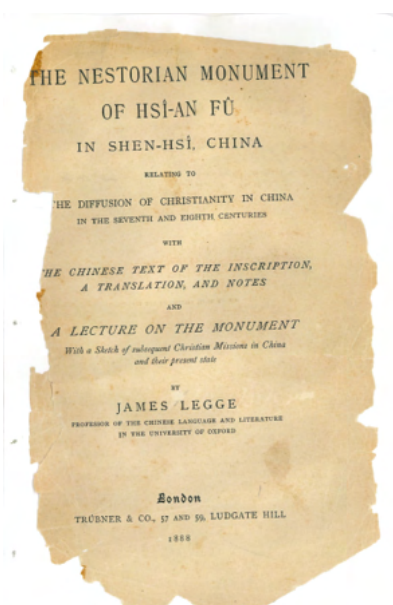
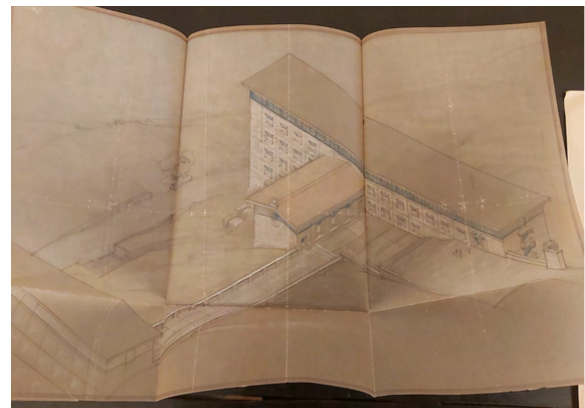
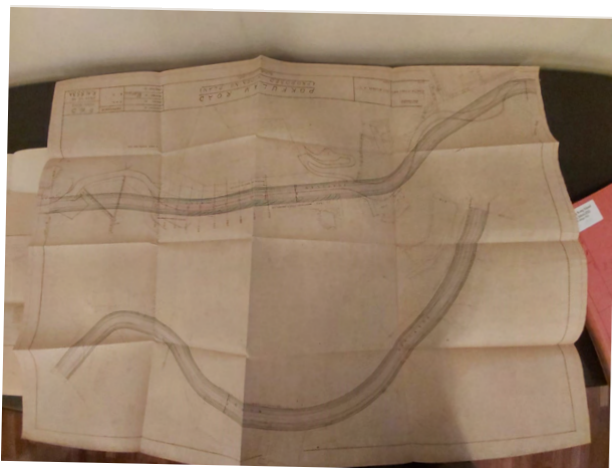
RECORDS ARRANGEMENT & CONSERVATION

RECORDS ARRANGEMENT, INDEXING AND SCANNING



The Archives conducts ongoing work in records arrangement, indexing and scanning. Bishop Gilbert Baker's correspondence has been properly indexed. Finding aids have also been made for materials on some of our Bishops.

CONSERVATION WORK



In the course of our daily Archives work, we encounter paper documents and records that are fragile or damaged. If possible, and within our abilities, our staff tries to apply what we have learned in our Conservation Course to repair these documents. For example, we applied these repair techniques to flatten the folded plans shown above and mount them on cardboard for preservation.



SHARING OUR WORK

BY TIFFANY KONG, HKSCH ARCHIVES

This year I had the honour of handling and establishing a special collection of Dr. Chien Ming Nian (James Chien). Our Archives acquired these materials through generous donations from Holy Carpenter Church and built a special collection from them.

Dr. Chien was an Anglican priest in Hong Kong and a social worker who made remarkable achievements in the local and international drug rehabilitation field. He was ordained a deacon in the Hong Kong Sheng Kung Hui by Bishop Baker in 1980 and ordained as non-stipendiary clergy by Bishop Peter Kong-kit Kwong in 1985. After that, he served in St. John's Cathedral and Holy Carpenter Church.

In reading his life, I was deeply impressed by his talent, efforts, passion and dedication to service. He continued to study and research various ways to improve drug rehabilitation and treatment work in response to changes in society. Although I have never met Dr. Chien, I can still be touched by his lifelong love for God and people and his passion for serving the community.

I believe that one of the missions of our Archives is to give thanks for the achievements of our predecessors and to pass on the spirit of their dedication.

SHARING OUR WORK

One of the things that has brought me great satisfaction this year is the completion of my book: *The Everflowing Gospel: The History of St. Stephen's Church (1865-2015)*. Many people helped me in my task, and I am very grateful to all of them. St. Stephen's may be regarded as the mother church for Chinese Anglicanism in Hong Kong. Its parish history is, therefore, a microcosm of the Hong Kong Anglican church as a whole. St. Stephen's is a church family, but it is part of an extended family. The extended family in the case of St. Stephen's includes other churches, the diocese and the province. Elements in the history of a parish are unique, but the parish is also part of a broader picture. This is especially the case for churches with an episcopal system of church order, such as the Sheng Kung Hui. In the parish histories of the HKSCH, especially those of the five oldest Chinese churches, of which St. Stephen's was the first, we can continually find parallels and make linkages. A parish history provides the detail that cannot easily be duplicated in more general histories. It is a particular history that is related to the regional, the national and the universal.
